



Anne Roberts, Nonprofit Consultant

Anne Roberts is a life-long advocate for the health and well-being of children and youth, having served for 20 years as CEO for the Oklahoma Institute for Child Advocacy, followed by 10 years at INTEGRIS Health as Director of Legislative Affairs. In these roles, she was a registered lobbyist, and worked with state and national policy makers to advance positive changes for Oklahoma families.

Now retired, she provides consulting services to a number of non-profit organizations. She has been a gubernatorial and legislative appointee to a variety of state-wide entities, including the Oklahoma Health Care Authority, the Oklahoma Department of Human Services and the Governor's Task Force on Workforce Development. In 2000, she was named National Child Advocate of the Year by Voices for America's Children, and was honored with the 2018 Visions Award by the Oklahoma Center for Nonprofits for her achievements in nonprofit advocacy and leadership.

Anne received her undergraduate and graduate degrees in music from the University of Oklahoma, and studied opera in Europe. She has enjoyed a long and diverse career as an accomplished singer of opera, musical theater, jazz and oratorio, and still maintains an active performance schedule. She is also a certified yoga instructor and an avid hiker. Anne's major volunteer activity is leading week-long excursions in the great outdoors.



The Duncan branch of AAUW began the 2022/2023 year hosting our annual planning meeting at the Duncan Library.

In October, we hosted a networking wine and appetizer event at the Chisholm Trail Heritage Center. The event was open to all women in Stephens County and we were pleased to have over thirty members and guests in attendance.

Our November meeting focused on the assembling of our chicken noodle soup packets. We sell these soup packets as our main fundraiser to support scholarships and awards for the year. This year we sold over 400 packets of soup mix.

The December meeting was a "Soup and Sweets" luncheon at the Chisholm Trail Arts Council Gallery. It featured our own chicken soup. We invited women, who had attended our October networking event and we are pleased that five women are now joining our branch of AAUW.

Our January, February, and March meetings focused on the planning for our county-wide Forum, which this year was a panel discussion on "Connections -Empowering Women". We also selected three women from Stephens County whom we nominated for the Oklahoma Women's Hall of Fame. In March, some of our members volunteered as judges at the Red River Technology Center Science Fair. Our branch presents a \$100 award to the Outstanding Female Contestant.

In April, we hosted our Forum panel "Connections – Empowering Women" at the Duncan Cameron University campus. Our panel consisted of four successful women from our area, who addressed questions on networking, mentoring, and interviewing. This event was open to the public and we were happy to have around thirty members and guests in attendance.

In May, we presented a gift and plaque to the Duncan High School Outstanding Girl, as selected by the DHS faculty. This is a tradition that the Duncan AAUW branch has performed since the 1920s. Our branch also presented a \$1000 scholarship to a Duncan High School graduating senior girl. We ended this year with a dinner hosted by members of our Branch.

Davis, and he presented each girl with a personalized Proclamation from the City of Edmond. Jo Ann Bullard read an essay written by branch member Megan Eisle who formerly was a middle school math teacher, titled "Girls and Math" (Megan now lives in the Pacific Northwest working on her PhD).

Diana Campo spoke about items contained in the gift bags, including the book, *Women in Science: 50 Fearless Pioneers Who Changed the World* by Rachel Ignotofsky. The AAUW Certificate of Excellence was also presented to each girl (certificates were made by Diane Chapel and the AAUW seal was affixed by her husband). A reception followed and Lynn Wiley assisted with the refreshments.

More than 80 friends and family members attended. The mayor met with parents and families after the presentations. This year teachers, media directors, administrators, and one principal from Edmond Public Schools attended showing their support for this AAUW program and the students honored. Middle school librarians liaised with teachers to nominate outstanding girls and to date more than 200 girls have been nominated. Erma Stewart, former Memorial High School librarian and longtime Edmond branch member, developed this program for AAUW branches to honor and build self-esteem and confidence in 7th grade girls. She is willing to consult with other AAUW branches looking to start this valuable program in their community.

The Edmond branch is looking forward this summer to their "Movie Afternoon Fundraiser". Jo Ann Bullard will host the branch at her home for pizza and watching a movie together. Members donate (if they so choose) what they would have spent going out for pizza and a movie. Easy way to raise funds for the branch and a fun social time!

Challenges of a Librarian in Today's World

Speakers: Jennifer Green, Librarian at Union Sixth & Seventh Grade Ctr.

In light of the recent complaints and charges on education and libraries from the Oklahoma Superintendent of Schools, in April the Tulsa branch AAUW invited two librarians to talk to us.

Jennifer Green spoke about her career as a public school librarian and some of the challenges she encountered.

Gisele McDaniel, a member of Tulsa AAUW, served as an academic librarian for 36 years at Tulsa Community College, Northeast Campus. She has been speaking with a librarian at Edison Middle School and passed on some of what she has learned from her. In addition she talked about her time at TCC Gisele is also a member of the Board for Friends of the Tulsa City County Library.

Our program covered the two Tulsa school districts, Union and Tulsa. Members brought a book for the book exchange; this way we recycled some of our

Weatherford

Fifty-one students from 26 counties and 38 different schools across Oklahoma graduated from the **fifth anniversary year** of the Southwest Alliance for Girls' Enrichment in Science, Technology, Engineering, the Arts/Humanities, and Math (SAGE STEAM) Camp on June 16, 2023. When including the five years of Tech Trek from 2013 to 2017, the Weatherford branch has accomplished ten years of camps (taking a one-year hiatus in 2020 for COVID-19) and impacted over 480 girls.



As you know, the SAGE STEAM Camp at SWOSU integrates the arts

and humanities in STEM with the goal to demonstrate that these careers are interesting, important, and attainable. The camp committee recruits middle school-aged girls who are interested in STEAM, but who have lower potential for STEAM experiences and/or who need that boost of confidence. Therefore, this camp provides a wide variety of hands-on experiences, positive interactions with women mentors, exposure to many career opportunities, and a taste of college life to foster the awareness and self-assurance in Oklahoma students to pursue additional activities, coursework, and futures in STEAM following camp.

AAUW of Oklahoma remains a vital part of this non-profit camp. Donations from branches and members enable camper families to pay \$200 or less of the actual \$1000 cost per camper. Members of the Weatherford branch volunteer their time, energy, and expertise to be part of the STEAM Team which plans and conducts outreach activities year-round. Furthermore, AAUW is featured on the camp t-shirt, in supporter publications, and on the green dorm group's Exponential Growth Award - This award recognizes campers who have blossomed with significant personal and professional growth over the week of camp. Overall, the focus of the SAGE STEAM Camp directly corresponds with AAUW's vision of, "Equity for all."

Oklahoma Women's Coalition, 2008—2023

Coalition History

Four determined women came together in 2007 with the common vision of a statewide women's coalition that would unite individuals and organizations as one powerful voice to initiate positive change for Oklahoma's women and girls. Dr. Jean Warner, Donna Lawrence, Jan Peery, and Pat Posts had



long seen the need for an organized voice for women and girls. The women approached the Oklahoma Legislative Coalition, a group of women's organizations that had jointly sponsored an Annual Day at the Capitol for more than 20 years. Member organizations voted to join the effort and direct their focus on policies and issues related to Oklahoma women and girls.

The Oklahoma Women's Coalition (OWC) was founded in 2008. Faye Henson, Weatherford branch, was the OWC Founding Treasurer and the American Association of University Women/Oklahoma was a Founding Organization. Other Founding Organizations included Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc.; YWCA Tulsa; Business and Professional Women; League of Women Voters of Oklahoma; Girl Scouts of Eastern Oklahoma; YWCA Oklahoma City; Girl Scouts—Western Oklahoma, Inc; and the Oklahoma Nurses Association.

The mission of the Oklahoma Women's Coalition was "to advance the potential of Oklahoma women and girls". The vision was to "secure legislation and policies that benefit women and girls by disseminating information on programs and issues that limit or enrich their lives".

The Oklahoma Women's Coalition was a statewide network of individuals and organizations working together to improve the lives of women and girls through education and advocacy. The Coalition promoted nonpartisan efforts, speaking with one voice, while addressing issues important to the progress of Oklahoma's women and girls. "

OWC sponsored an "Advocacy Day at the Capitol and Issues Forum" for many years. Several years ago, AAUW/OK President Lisa Appeddu hosted the AAUW booth at the state capitol handing out AAUW materials. Gary and Jeanna Wing spoke with their legislator about issues while Diana Campo and Shelli Wasson gave office staff information provided by the OWC on current bills before the legislature that affected women and girls. Many AAUW members from across Oklahoma have taken part in Advocacy Day.

AAAUW/OK had several Summer Leadership Meetings and board meetings at the OWC headquarters located at the Oklahoma Center for Nonprofits on Wilshire Ave.

Shelli Wasson, Edmond branch, was a member of the Board of Directors 2010-2012. Any other AAUW members that were on the OWC Board of Directors should contact Shelli Wasson so this information can be included in the archives.

All money remaining in the OWC accounts has been distributed to a nonprofit entity that closely held the Coalition's values and purpose.
